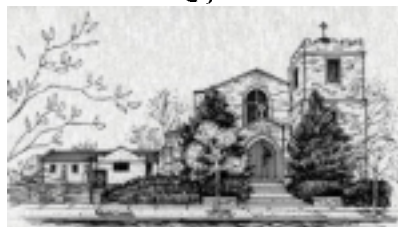

NOTES FOR THE JOURNEY

In late spring of last year I learned of the Clergy Renewal program sponsored by the Lilly Foundation, and with very short notice and the assistance of some parishioners we wrote and submitted a grant proposal. (A full copy of this grant will be available online at the Trinity website.) The Lilly Foundation is an Indianapolis-based private philanthropy funding grants primarily in community development, education, and religion. It “seeks to strengthen Christian congregations by providing an opportunity for pastors to step away briefly from the persistent obligations of daily parish life and to engage in a period of renewal and reflection. Renewal periods are not vacations, but times for intentional exploration and reflection, for drinking again from God’s life-giving waters, for regaining enthusiasm and creativity for ministry.”

The Diocese of Missouri includes provisions for continuing education each year and for earning sabbatical time as part of every rector’s Letter of Agreement. The specifics for my sabbatical were amended to my Letter of Agreement with Trinity in 2003.

In late September of 2009 Trinity received the exciting news that we had been awarded a Lilly Endowment Clergy Renewal Grant. The grant is for \$35,000 and is given both for congregational expenses and for the study purposes of the rector. This means that clergy supply during the sabbatical time comes at no cost to Trinity, and the grant will cover other expenses related to congregational activity. The parish continues full pay and benefits for the rector during this time.

I will embark on a four-month sabbatical, the first of my twenty years in ordained ministry, immediately after Easter this year. Easter Sunday will be the send-off point, and I’ll return on July 26th. This time includes both sabbatical and vacation time. Since the Lilly Endowment is concerned with the stresses of ministry on clergy families the Clergy Renewal grants support family participation in sabbatical activities, enabling my husband to travel with me.

The schedule for the sabbatical is somewhat fluid to allow for necessary changes in travel arrangements and to take advantage of opportunities that arise unexpectedly. We will be traveling first to Istanbul and then to Israel. Jerusalem, Petra, Masada and Mt. Sinai are among the destinations. The largest amount of time will be spent in Ohio taking time for writing. A two week retreat at the Monastery of Christ in the Desert will conclude my time away.

The Rev. Ron Clingenpeel will preach and celebrate during the months I am away and provide pastoral care on a regular and emergency basis. I am very happy to have such an experienced priest available as a consistent presence here at Trinity. Ron will be in the office on Wednesdays and Thursdays as well as Sundays. He will provide a supply clergy person in the event that he is unable to be present on any one particular Sunday. The Wednesday and Thursday celebrations of Holy Eucharist will continue as usual. Clergy associated with the parish will also be available for pastoral care as well as will be our intern, Marc Smith. The parish will also be in good hands with Senior Warden Dave Hilditch and Junior Warden Michael Haggans taking leadership of the vestry.

I am grateful for this Sabbath time and look forward to a renewal of some creative energies. Plans for sharing what I learn and what the parish learns will be developed more fully on my return - at the very least you can look forward to one or more noon forums or educational offerings based on my experiences. As always, I welcome your questions and observations as we embark on this interesting part of our journey together.

Joseph Neilson to Play Second Organ Concert March 7

BUILDING EXPANSION COMMITTEE FORMED

For most of the 25 years I have been at Trinity I have heard about the five-year plan to create a larger South Parish Hall so that all members of Trinity can sit and have a meal together. And, as I became more aware of the problems with the building itself a number of years ago, it became clear that we needed to do more than just talk about a five year plan – we needed to start it.

A new committee (Jan Parker, Michael Haggans, Denver Wright, Jeff Wunrow, Steve Turner, and yours truly) has been established to look into expanding the South Parish Hall. Lavatories, an expanded kitchen, air conditioning and additional storage for the food ministry will be considered. The vestry has asked that this committee also research and make recommendations on all of the facilities issues raised during the strategic planning process, such as accessibility into the church, office and memorial garden, outside glass doors to let light into the Narthex and making green improvements.

This is not something that is going to happen overnight, but it is a process that needs to begin if it is ever going to happen.

This new committee is asking for additional input from the congregation. As this committee addresses the future building needs of our community, is there additional information you would like to contribute? Any space needs we may not have considered? COPE Helps Prisoners Start New Lives

As a new member of Trinity who has transferred from St. John's Church in Eolia, I would very much like to interest 4 to 6 Trinity members in forming a team to be the only Episcopal congregation working with Cope. This organization helps men and women being released from prison start new lives. Nationally, some 75% of ex-offenders return to prison, a tremendous humanitarian cost as well as a financial one to all of us. Each year some 5,000 persons are released to St. Louis with a bus ticket, a few dollars in their pockets, only the clothes on their backs, and little preparation for the many problems they will encounter.

Members of Cope's teams are enriched and fulfilled by helping someone begin a new life. Such a partnership is a bridge across race, class, culture and familiar expectations. Hundreds apply for help from Cope and only a few carefully screened applicants can be accepted. For team members, there is not a large time commitment during a year's help to one person. Cope works alongside each team and provides housing and help finding jobs for the released person.

Annual Meeting Held January 24

Parishioners turned out in force for the 155th Annual Meeting of Trinity Parish on January 24, following a single service at 9:30 a.m.. The main orders of business included reports, approval of the 2010 budget, and election of new Vestry members (all presented in full in the printed Annual Report, which is available from the church office.) **Dave Hilditch** was named Senior Warden and **Michael Haggans** Junior Warden.

Elected to the Vestry were:

JEFF FARRIS (3-year term) Jeff has attended Trinity for over a year. He regularly serves on the altar as crucifer, co-chairs the spirituality committee, and is also active in Paseo con Cristo. Jeff is a graduate of Washington University with an A.B. in economics and history. He works for NARAL Pro-Choice Missouri as their health policy director and serves as co-president of the St. Louis Freedom of Choice Council.

STEVEN FORSYTH (3-year term) Steven was born in St. Louis, baptized in the Methodist Church, and confirmed at the Church of the Intercession in Ft. Lauderdale, Fla., in 1980. There he was active in Episcopal Men's Cursillo and was a member of two Cursillo teams. He served twice on the vestry, once as junior warden. He was a chalice bearer and licensed lay eucharistic minister and was a member of the Order of St. Luke the Physician, serving one year as chapter co-convenor. He also completed an Education for Ministry program. Steven came to Trinity in 2006 and has served here as a lay eucharistic minister A graduate of the University of Missouri-St. Louis with a B.A. in Spanish, he is licensed by the state of Missouri as a psychiatric nurse's aide. He currently works with homeless developmentally disabled adults at St. Louis' Horizon Club.

MICHAEL HAGGANS (3-year term) Michael and Kate have been members of Trinity since the first Sunday of Advent 1992, when they walked in with their children, Matthew and Kiri, and never left. They had visited some dozen parishes after moving from Tucson. Something about the spirit of this place and the people brought us back and never let go. Professionally, he was a university architect for the University of Missouri and later, the University of Arizona, working in private practice for the last twenty years on projects for universities from Edmonton to Chapel Hill. He is now teaching and writing full time, this year at the University of Kansas two days a week. When his architecture practice allowed, he has sung in the choir, served on the vestry

twice in the '90s, been junior warden, and chaired the aesthetics committee.

RON TOMPKINS (3-year term) Ron was born and spent his first six years in Noel, Mo., after which his family relocated to Denver, where he graduated from high school and college. His initial degree from the University of Northern Colorado was in English and Fine Arts, followed by a master's in English from the University of Colorado. He taught art for two years in Canada and then English at the University of Northern Colorado for two years, after which he began nursing school, moving through licensure as an LPN, a BSN, and a combined master's in Nursing Administration and Health Administration. He worked as a staff nurse, head nurse, director, and executive in Pediatrics and Obstetrics at University Hospital in Denver. He was recruited to St. Louis by SSM Health Care in 1993 and until 2008 worked in various executive positions at St. Mary's, DePaul, and St. Joseph's Hospital. He now serves as chief nursing officer for the Nurses for Newborns Foundation. Ron first visited Trinity with friends on Christmas Day of 1997. After three months at Trinity, he decided he was home and moved his membership here. Since then he has served on Sacristy and as Lead Sacristan for more than 10 years. He was the "newcomer" on the Search Committee that called Anne Kelsey as rector and then served on the Vestry. He has been a delegate representing Trinity at Metro II and Diocesan Convention for the past five years. He was one of the original Trinity representatives to the Holy Grounds Collaborative, and assisted with reestablishing the Trinity Food Ministry as a ministry connected to the entire parish rather than as a location for this ministry. He has been chair of the Trinity Food Ministry Board and wrote the bylaws for the TFM Board. He also served on the board of directors for Episcopal City Mission and is currently active on both the Trinity Arts Committee and the Liturgy Committee.

RIP VAN WINKLE (2-year term) Rip was baptized at the age of 17 in a Baptist church in his hometown of Virden, Ill. He was confirmed at Christ Church Cathedral about 25 years ago. He served there on the Cathedral Chapter as business committee and finance chair. He also began the annual Easter brunch and chaired it several times. He began coming to Trinity in the early '90s and started the Easter brunch tradition here. He has been chair or co-chair of the brunch almost every year since then, working the last few years with Gil Fisher. Rip has served on the arts committee and as chair of the fellowship committee. He is interested in being involved with early planning for the South Parish Hall

improvements because of his experience working in the current kitchen.

TED TAYLOR (1-year term) Ted is a "cradle" Episcopalian-- beginning at Grace Church, Kirkwood, in the '40s, then moving to St. Michael and St. George, where Etta and he were married in 1957, and finally joining Trinity (at Etta's urging) in 1982. After a slow start, he has become increasingly involved and now cannot imagine going anywhere else. He graduated from Washington U. in 1951 and Michigan Law School in 1956, and practiced law in St. Louis with Bryan Cave until retirement in early 1992. Service while a member of Trinity parish includes: Search Committee (chair) that called The Rev. Jennifer Phillips in 1995, member (and chair) of Diocesan Companion relationship committee during Bishop Rockwell's time here; diocesan delegate; and more recently, ushers' committee (chair), collection counters, and volunteering with Meals On Wheels.

PAT WAY (1-year term) Pat was confirmed at Trinity in 1978, having been a Roman Catholic all her life. She began attending the 10:30 service when her two sons, Bryan and Michael, were in Sunday School, and serving on the altar. She later became a regular attendee at the 8 o'clock service because of her work schedule. She recently retired after teaching for 38 years in East St. Louis, first as a teacher of English, speech, and drama at the high school and later in elementary special education. During that time she also worked for three years as a paramedic at St. Anthony's Hospital. At Trinity Pat has helped in the nursery and with fundraising events, including auctions and Mustard Seed Festivals. She is a member of the Trinity book group.

BETTY WEBER was named delegate to the Diocesan Convention (no biographical material provided.)

TRINITY FOOD MINISTRY

The period between Thanksgiving and Christmas is truly a giving season. And the Food Ministry has received some most appreciated gifts of food.

Every year the children of the Old Bonhomme School in the Ladue district have a giving assembly just before Thanksgiving Day. They collect toys, school supplies, clothing and food to be given to various agencies which help the poor. For the last few years, Trinity Food Pantry has been selected to receive the food. This year the school community gathered 2,000 cans of food and donated them to our pantry.

In November, the Boy Scouts have solicited food for their annual food drive. The food is distributed through the St. Louis Area Food Bank, of which we are a member. In November we received 50 cases of food from this effort and will receive an equal amount until all is given usually sometime in March or April.

As has been the custom in the past few years, the Great Frame Up, the framing shop on Euclid near Laclede, has offered a discount on framing to customers who bring in "food for the hungry." We are grateful that the cans of food are donated to our pantry. So far this year, we have received Approximately 2,000 cans and 339 boxes of things such as macaroni and cheese.

In addition, churches have particularly generous during this season. The Church of St. Michael and St. George donated to us a large quantity of food from a recent food drive.

Thanks to all of you who have made end-of -year donations to Trinity Food Ministry. While the above mentioned donors have helped us with cans of food, please remember that we must purchase fresh produce, margarine and eggs each week.

Congratulations to the Rev. Anne Kelsey and Trinity CWE*(from the Diocesan online newsletter)*

Trinity, Central West End, has received a grant of \$35,069 to enable its minister, Anne Kelsey, to participate in the 2009 National Clergy Renewal Program funded by the Indianapolis-based Lilly Endowment Inc. Trinity is one of 149 congregations across the country that will support their ministers in the program, which allows pastors to step back from their busy lives and renew their spirits for the benefit of their ongoing ministries.

Now in its 10th year, the program invites Christian congregations and ministers to plan a period of intentional reflection and renewal. It provides a time for ministers to take a break from their daily obligations and gain the fresh perspective and renewed energy that a carefully considered "sabbath time" of travel, study, rest and prayer can provide. The 149 grants this year total \$6.2 million.

At Trinity both the congregation and the priest will focus on nature and spirituality. There will a parish retreat based on the theme of scripture as written in nature, and in the spring be a rogation walk around the neighborhood is planned. Speakers will be invited to address the role of the church in environmental issues. During her absence from the parish Kelsey will focus on different environments from urban to desert. She and her husband will travel to Israel to Neve Shalom, a village of Arab Palestinian Israelis and Jews. They will visit Jerusalem and the separation wall. She will spend six weeks writing about spirituality and the environment, and go on retreat at the Monastery of Christ in the Desert in Abiquiu, New Mexico.

The Endowment's larger goal is to bolster the work that America's pastors and congregations accomplish day in and day out and to reinforce and build upon important work being done on both sides of the pulpit. "In our grantmaking, we hope to strengthen the efforts of today's excellent pastors because pastors who have reconnected themselves to the passions that led them to the ministry in the first place are more likely to lead healthy and vibrant congregations," noted Craig Dykstra, Lilly Endowment senior vice president for religion.
